Non-Profit Spotlight: Friends of Hartland Inc.

Incorporated as a non-profit organization in 2014, Friends of Hartland Inc. (FOH) has been dedicated to enhancing our community by donating to projects that have improved Hartland's recreational, cultural, and community offerings for both residents and visitors alike. Operated by volunteers, and without overhead expenses, FOH does not initiate their own projects but works closely with the Town of Hartland to identify areas where dollars can make a difference.

Since 2014, FOH has operated a weekly 50/50 draw with half the proceeds of ticket sales awarded to raffle winners and the remaining half donated to the Town of Hartland. Some notable projects made possible by donation of raffle proceeds include \$17,000 toward the circulation desk at the Dr. Walter Chestnut Library, \$3,800 for concrete picnic tables at the waterfront, \$10,000 to construction of public washrooms beside the Visitor Information Centre and

a donation of more than \$120,000 supporting the construction of the Day & Ross Community Centre. A plaque at the entrance of its Community Room states "built by community, for community" acknowledging that money donated to the Town from FOH was from weekly 50/50 ticket sales purchased by community members.

Since 2015, FOH has been registered as a Canadian charity and, as such, is able to issue tax receipts for direct donations. Individuals and corporations who make donations to FOH for specific projects (ie. the Day & Ross Community Centre) are recognized for the same and their donations are considered separately from the monies forwarded to the Town as proceeds from the FOH weekly 50/50 draw. Information about FOH, including financial statements, can be found on the Government of Canada Charities and Giving website.

The Friends of Hartland 50/50 draw is held

every Tuesday at noon. Tickets for this week's draw, and future draws, are available online at www.friendsofhartland.ca and in person at the Hartland Freshmart. 2025 Fun Park Plans

Our 2025 summer camp runs from June 30 to August 22 at the Recreational Facilities site, 400 McLean Ave., Hartland. Designed for children aged 5 to 13, it's the perfect way for kids to stay active and make new friends.

This year's Fun Park lineup includes crafts, outdoor games, swimming, an obstacle course, and activities on the ball fields, soccer field, walking track, and in the community room.

A highlight of the summer is the year-end sleepover, where campers enjoy a night of campfire stories, games, and special surprises—a perfect way to wrap up an incredible season.

The cost for one child is \$30 per day, \$125 per week, or \$800 for the full season, including 8 weeks of supervised activities. Families enrolling two or more children get discounted rates of \$25 per day, \$100 per week, or \$600 per child for the season.

Kids just need to bring a lunch and an indoor pair of sneakers. Space is limited, so register early via email.

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Water and Sewer Line Flushing Planned



The Town of Hartland is planning to conduct routine water line and sewer line flushing in May and June as weather permits.

This essential maintenance helps ensure a clean, reliable water supply and an efficiently functioning sewer system. Over time, mineral deposits and sediment can accumulate in the pipes, potentially affecting water quality and pressure. By flushing the lines, we remove these buildups, improve flow, and maintain the overall integrity of the system.

Flushing involves releasing controlled bursts of water through the system to clear out any sediment or debris. This is a routine process used by municipalities to maintain high water quality and prevent long-term issues such as blockages or pipe corrosion. While the process is temporary, it is a necessary step in keeping Hartland's water and sewer infrastructure in top condition.

Residents may notice temporary changes in their water during the flushing process. It is common to

experience fluctuations in water pressure and, in some cases, discoloured water. This is caused by the disturbance of harmless sediment within the pipes and is a normal part of the process. The town works to minimize any disruptions, but we appreciate your patience as this maintenance is completed.

If you experience discoloured water, run your cold water tap for several minutes until it clears. It is best to avoid doing laundry during flushing periods to prevent staining of clothes. If discolouration persists, please contact Public Works department at 506-328-7676 for further assistance. While the water remains safe to use, allowing the system to settle and running the taps should resolve most issues.

We appreciate the cooperation of residents as we complete this necessary work. Updates on flushing schedules will be shared through the town's communication channels.


A Fun-Filled March Break in Hartland

These special collection days align with your regular Hartland garbage schedule and offer an opportunity to clear out bulky items.

To help collection crews work efficiently, please ensure everything is boxed, bagged, tied, or bundled where possible. Households can place up to three large items alongside their regular garbage. Please note that residential construction waste, motor vehicle parts, liquid waste, propane tanks, toxic materials, tires, and appliances with coolant (e.g., refrigerators or air conditioners) will not be accepted.

Tree cuttings must be tied securely in bundles, with branches no larger than 2 inches in diameter, under 4 feet in length, and weighing no more than 50 pounds.

Get Ready for Summer Recreation!!!

Hartland is gearing up for an action-packed summer of recreation in 2025! From ball hockey and baseball to community events and new program expansions, there's something for everyone to enjoy.

April and May will kick off the season with the return of Hartland's Ball Hockey League and spring training for baseball and softball, which will likely take the form of an indoor Wiffleball Program. The community will also come together on April 22 for an Earth Day Clean-Up event.

In May, the popular CO-ED Softball League returns alongside the "Let the Girls Play" tournament, and WVRA GO GIRLS will bring Grade 8 girls from Carleton North and Hartland together for a day of sports. Summer registration days are set for May 14 and May 20 at the Day & Ross Community Centre, with a live activity night to boost participation.

Summer sports ramp up in June with afterschool baseball and softball clinics, including the Pitch, Hit & Run program. Shuffleboard begins at the golf course, and a new 3-on-3 basketball league is in the works. The community pool is scheduled to open in the third week of June, just in time for HCS swim day, and Fun Park will launch on June 30 with an increased capacity.

July brings the start of U9 and U11 baseball, swimming lessons, and soccer for multiple age groups. Canada Day celebrations, NB Special Olympics (July 17–19), and the Western Valley

Regional Games (July 23–24) will keep the town buzzing with excitement.

The summer fun continues into August with the NB Parade and Colour Run during the New Brunswick Day long weekend of Big Bridge Fest Weekend, and the 2nd Annual Hartland Sports Fest (August 22–24), featuring a variety of sports tournaments and activities.

As September rolls in, NBBI's school softball program begins, while other leagues continue until the weather changes. Ice will be built in the third week of September, with several organizations already showing interest in early-season bookings.

Beyond just sports, these programs provide a fantastic opportunity for community engagement and personal growth. Whether it is kids developing their athletic skills, families enjoying local events, or adults staying active, there's something for all ages. The increased accessibility of programs like Fun Park and the new basketball league ensures that even more residents can take part and experience the benefits of an active lifestyle.
