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# Hartland's 2025 Financial Roadmap

Each year, Council approves two operating budgets and one capital budget. The operating budgets cover short-term expenses for staff and Council, recreation, policing and fire protection, waste collection, roads, and water and sewer systems. The capital budget covers long-term investments in municipal assets and infrastructure. Most revenue in the general operating budget comes from property taxes, while most in the utility operating budget comes from water and sewer fees. Revenue from other sources provides less than 15% of total revenue in these two operating budgets.

Most expenditures in Hartland's general operating budget are non-discretionary. For example, policing service from the RCMP will cost more than \$1M in 2025, which represents more than 25% of the general budget. Other non-discretionary costs, such as fees for waste collection and regional services, are set externally. In 2025, most of these non-discretionary costs will increase between 5% and 10%. In addition, Hartland will see higher costs for its new Day & Ross Community Centre, about \$250,000 more to cover debt repayment, additional staffing, and higher energy costs.

Beyond these commitments, like its residents, Hartland will pay more for everything from office supplies to electricity and fuel. Since Hartland must pay more to provide services, it must also save more for critical investments.

Over the next five years, Hartland plans to invest \$3.6M to replace fire and public works vehicles, upgrade its aging water and sewer system, and develop the downtown and waterfront.

To execute this capital plan, Hartland must put some of its operating revenue into capital reserves, or savings, about 2.5% to 5% each year. The funding that Hartland receives from donations and government grants will not be enough.

Therefore, to cover increased operating costs and save capital funds for Hartland's future, Council has decided to increase property tax rates and water and sewer fees.

The property tax rate in old Hartland will increase by 1.5 cents per \$100 of property assessment value, while the property tax rate in Brighton, Simonds, Somerville, Peel, and Wakefield will increase by 3.0 cents per \$100. Coldstream will see a 0.0044 cent decrease to further harmonize rates. The increase for former LSDs reflects the agreement that the LSDs made years ago to accept a 7.5 cent increase to help cover the costs of the new centre. Considering past rate increases, Council has agreed to implement less than 50% of the 7.5 cent increase

in 2025. Council has also decided to reduce the commercial multiplier to 1.6, to protect and promote the health of local businesses.

With respect to its water and sewer fees, which only apply to "old" Hartland, fees will increase by about 5%. Council approved this increase to cover the higher costs of maintaining its water and sewer system, and to save funds for future upgrades, for example, to install new lines for housing developments, which are expected to add about 100 new dwellings in Hartland by 2026.

While adjusting rates and fees for 2025, Hartland continues to aggressively pursue grants from provincial and federal programs such as the Housing Accelerator Fund (HAF). As Hartland moves forward with housing developments and critical infrastructure investments, it expects to receive substantial funding from these programs, which will help keep rates and fees lower in the future.

Council made the difficult decision to raise rates and fees to strengthen Hartland's fiscal health, services, and infrastructure, while supporting growth and development in both housing and industry. Council believes strongly in these investments and has confidence that they will benefit Hartland in 2025 and for many years to come.

# **Town Supports Local Organizations**

# Newly Branded Signage Unveiled

The existing Hartland sign in the grass median by the library was also replaced to coordinate with this updated signage. This exciting project was made possible with funding from the provincial government. # **New Community Centre Opens Doors**

After 57 years of memories and countless games, Hartland's beloved arena, affectionately known as "The Barn," has closed its doors. Built in 1967, The Barn earned its nickname from its bone-chilling temperatures that everyone in town remembers. For generations, the old arena was the heart of Hartland's sports scene, providing a place where the community gathered for hockey, skating, and special events. Though it was time to say goodbye, the legacy of The Barn will live on in Hartland's history.

On Friday, November 15, Hartland welcomed the future with the opening of the long-awaited Day & Ross Community Centre. The new facility, designed to meet the growing needs of the community, includes an ice surface, walking track, community room, community kitchen, and fitness room. These additions will serve as a modern hub for sports, fitness, and gatherings, reflecting Hartland's commitment to providing top-notch amenities for residents of all ages.

Hartland Mayor Tracey DeMerchant sang a heartfelt rendition of O Canada. The sense of pride in the new arena and the continued support for local sports was palpable.

The puck drop was met with applause and

excitement as the first game on the new rink got underway.

Though the November 15 opening was considered a "soft" launch, it was a memorable start to what will be a busy season at the complex. Hockey games, recreational skating, and fitness activities are scheduled, and the new facility has quickly become a popular destination for residents of all ages. The bleachers are designed to give spectators an ideal vantage point for hockey games, figure skating events, and more. At the back of the building, the Community Room, Community Kitchen, and Fitness Room offer even more ways to engage. The Community Room, with its ample space, is ideal for meetings, workshops, or group gatherings. 
